

























# ANALOGIES

Directions: Look at the first two pictures. They go together. Now look at the next pair. What picture goes with it the same way? Circle the answer.

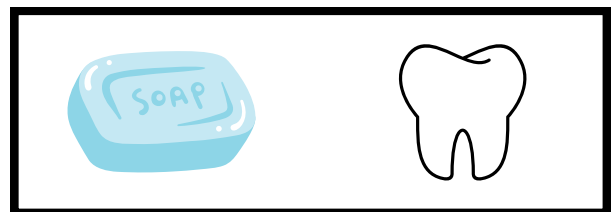
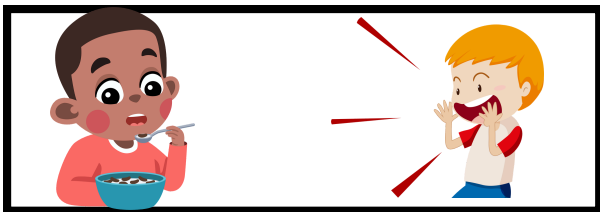
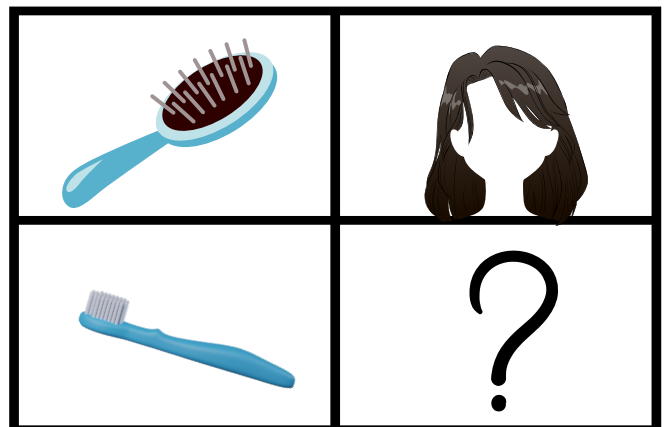
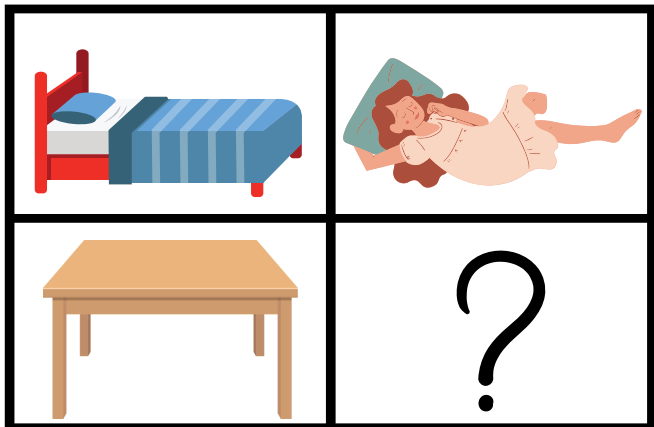
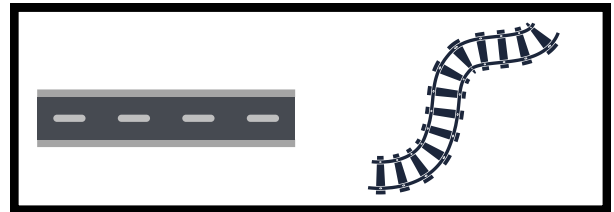
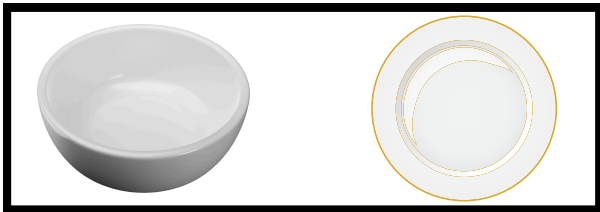
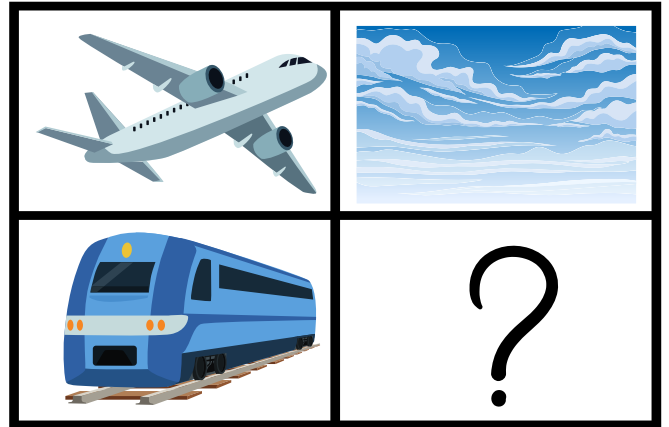
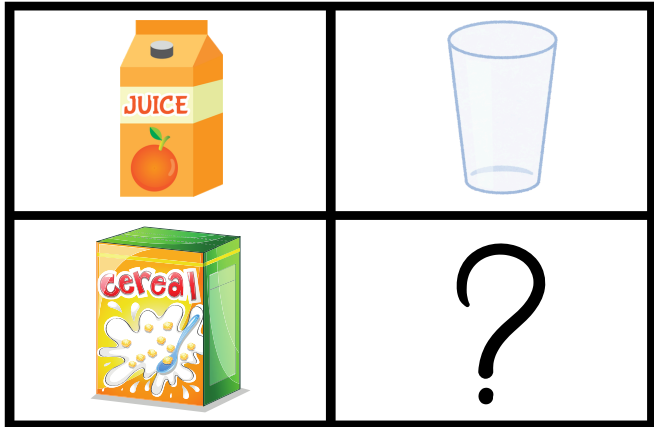
	
	
	




Tip: Try making your own and encourage your child to explain *why* the items go together.
